The Michelson Method™ for Philanthropy

- 1. Never invest in something that will get done anyway
- 2. Invest catalytically. Use resources to produce an outsized benefit, rather than being consumed.
- 3. Disrupt broken systems

- 5. Assess the amount of good achieved per dollar spent.
- 6. If you care about outcomes, then do it yourself
- 7. Invest in what makes your heart sing
